Equipping Effective Practitioners

You can enrol part-time for a Certificate (one year), Diploma (two years), or Master's (three years). The course is validated by Durham University, one of the Russell Group's 24 world-class research-intensive universities.

The aim of St Padarn's programme is to offer postgraduate education in chaplaincy studies in partnership with the relevant professional bodies:

- as continuing professional development at an advanced level for individuals engaged in chaplaincy work
- for candidates for chaplaincy ministries who have already studied theology to degree level
- for individuals wishing to pursue chaplaincy studies at postgraduate level.

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At St Padarn's, we offer learning targeted at your specialism (education, health, military, prison, sport etc). Most of your modules will be studied alongside peers working in the same or a similar sector. Your teaching will be delivered by expert chaplains and academic specialists who have been carefully selected for their ability to equip you for leadership in your role. An Expert Teaching Team

David Crees is Deputy Principal and Chief Instructor at the Defence Academy Armed Forces Chaplaincy Centre. A Course for Working Professionals

To meet the needs of working professionals, teaching is delivered in three intensive blocks each year¹. Residentials take place from Monday to Wednesday at our site in Cardiff where we enjoy an extensive library and well-equipped teaching rooms. Our en-suite accommodation is modern and purpose-built. Meals are freshly cooked onsite, and we cater for special dietary requirements.

You are welcome to worship alongside members of our theological college in our attractive chapel. In addition to our comfortable common room, you may wish to explore the nearby cathedral, shops, cafes, pubs, and riverside walks.

In the master's programme, students study three modules a year for two years, followed by a years' dissertation writing. In year three, students are encouraged to attend the residentials as members of our learning community and work on their dissertations with access to the library, teaching staff.

¹ Military Chaplains attend a fourth residential, but others can attend also as an optional extra.

To obtain the MA Chaplaincy Studies, students must complete six taught modules and a 15,000-word dissertation.

UKBHC Accreditation

For those working in the health care sector it is possible to combine any of our courses with the UK Board of Health Care Chaplains Accreditation. The UKBHC registration requires both a PG Cert in Chaplaincy Studies and evidence of safety to practice in the form of a portfolio. The latter is compiled under the supervision of a Practice Placement Assessor (PPA). We advise you to contact us at the earliest possible opportunity so we can work together to identify your PPA. Learners seeking UKBHC accreditation will need to:

- 1. Conduct an initial assessment of practice experience and development needs; and identify capabilities and competencies to be developed through the placement.
- 2. Take part in monthly reflective practice supervisions.
- 3. Submit monthly reflective practice reports (verbatims, journals, etc).
- 4. Set up observed sessions on specific elements of practice.
- 5. Complete and sign placement professional practice reports on development, capabilities and competencies.

Closing Date, Entry Criteria, and Application Process

The closing date for applications is end July. The usual entry criteria are a 2:1 degree with two years' experience of chaplaincy or a 2:2 degree with substantial professional experience. If you do not meet these criteria, please get in touch to discuss your available options. ² Those taking only the Postgrad Certificate will take Reflective Practice instead of Research Methods. If at the end of year 1 you decide to continue onto the MA, you can do Research Methods at the start of Year 2.

³ Moral Issues and Chaplaincy in Context are taught on alternative years – But taught in specialisms (all military together and health, education, prisons, together). In the 2024-25 academic year we will be teaching Chaplaincy in Context.
